## Calvin's Corner:

Although I have served New Hope for over a year as Retired Supply, I believe we both sensed God's leading to a more official appointment. It was a long and slow process but I am pleased that it has come to fruition.

I suspect that over the past year we have gotten to know each other to some extent, and I look forward to getting even better acquainted, but I thought I would use the opportunity to share a bit of who I am and how I came to this place. My wife Eileen and I moved into the area almost 9 years ago to serve the Cold Springs Pastoral Charge after a 5 year ministry in Bermuda. I know – why didn't we stay? You only have to live on a small island for a short while to really appreciate the expansive beauty of Hamilton Township's hills and shores - despite the snow and cold! Besides we missed family. (We now have 10 grandsons!)



Then writing this the Lectionary text was on Jesus calling disciples and I marveled at their ability to leave all behind and follow. I don't know if I could have done that if I had a wife and career like Simon Peter. When I sensed the call of God in my life I was a care-free 20 year old and had nothing to hold me back. I had already spent a summer in South America as a missionary with the Baptist Church and was completing my credentials as a single engine pilot in preparation to be a missionary pilot, flying into exotic remote villages, but God had other ideas for my life.



As I prepared for what I wanted to do, 4 years in the Ontario Bible College (now Tyndale) and then 3 years in Trinity Evangelical Divinity School in Illinois, God was actually preparing me to do what God wanted, and that was pastoral ministry. Wanting a fresh start I applied and was accepted to serve the United Church. I completed their mandatory courses at Emmanuel College while serving Scugog Island U.C. From there we would head off to Bermuda and then to Cold Springs. (That's a lot of life in a few lines!)

In 2023 I retired but knew Ministers don't really retire. Ours is a calling and not a job or a career. As Paul so eloquently said it: "Woe is me if I preach not the Gospel!" And so after coming along side New Hope to help out, Eileen and I sensed the genuine love and welcome you had for us and it drew us in.

Small church ministry may not be for everyone but we find it rewarding, allowing that intimate contact that builds an accountable fellowship. It also means they get to
